Agency Plans for 2007

AV is looking forward during the coming months to consolidate and build on the impressive list of accomplishments of the past year. The major focus of our efforts will be to maintain the quality of all our programs and services with your support. Volunteers contribute immeasurably to the success and reach of our efforts to support persons living with as well as those affected by HIV.

Building on the foundation of our current strategic and communication plans we have begun the process of creating an agency 'signature', including a new logo, which will enable us to be consistent in the design and identity of all AV's publications and website. The website redesign will reflect a dynamic and creative image and enable us to communicate more clearly that image to the community.

In this quarter we will be relocating Gayway, Prevention and Volunteer Resources to 900 Helmcken Street. This new location will enable us to strengthen all of our prevention, care

and support programs into two sites, both within two blocks of each other.



The PARC Library is now linked to four other libraries across the country. It is offering a new service to help you stay current with HIV resources and news: the AIDS Vancouver Library Blog! For further information please see our Librarian's detailed report in this newsletter edition.

Following the enormous success of World AIDS Day 2006, planning is well underway to

expand both the Red Ribbon Campaign and Project Stitch for December 2007. We will launch the Red Ribbon Campaign in late September with our partner BC Fashion Week. As well, we will increase our efforts to link a major fund raising activity during this time.

AV will mark its 25th anniversary in 2008. Planning is currently underway to record and tell the story in both audio and visual formats. We are planning for a series of events over the course of the year to acknowledge and honor the individuals who have contributed to making AV a recognized and relevant AIDS Serving Organization.

Launch of CONNECT: Canadian HIV/AIDS Information Gateway
CONNECT is an on-line catalogue. You can use this catalogue to search the library collections of the five largest HIV/AIDS libraries in Canada. This represents a combined collection of over 67, 000 books, videos, DVDs, journal articles and resources. It covers diverse topics such as, HIV/AIDS prevention, treatment, and legal/

ethical issues. Production of the website was made possible by a financial contribution from the Public Health Agency of Canada.

ED Report: Agency Highlights

Administration:

This year's annual mail campaign focused on the Grocery Program and has been a great success.

Prevention:

Gayway staff participated in the Gay Men's Health Summit. AIDS Vancouver supported the work of the Community Based Research Centre in producing the second gay men's health conference.

Education and Outreach: The Prevention Educators in collaboration with staff across the agency are developing the new agency training curriculum. This curriculum will be more in depth and comprehensive in responding to current learning and information needs regarding the agency, volunteerism at AV as well as HIV and related issues.

Client Services:

Case Management:

- The Case Management team welcomed several new staff:
- Lukas Maitland is our new Case Manager at Vancouver Native Health.
- Stephanie Smith is a Case Manager working on contract to March 31st, 2007. Stephanie came to us with extensive experience in legal advocacy and mental health, and has hit the ground running as an intensive case manager.
- Tomiye Ishida has joined the Case Management team and has worked with the Maximally Assisted Therapy program at the Downtown Community Health Centre, as well as with the BC Centre for Excellence in HIV/AIDS.

Library/ Helpline/ Reception:

- After several years of planning, the Connect Project, linking the collections

of 5 HIV libraries across Canada finally came to fruition in early December.

Grocery/ Nutrition Exchange:

- We had a very successful Holiday Grocery in December. Once again, we distributed over 900 festive bags of food to individuals and families to assist them throughout the holiday season.
- The Nutrition Exchange program received a \$5000 grant from the Royal Bank of Canada Foundation. This funding will enable us to continue this very successful project throughout 2007. A newly developed volunteer team of Nutritionists and Dieticians will be responsible for developing and delivering this service. Kelly Spec, the Nutrition Education Coordinator, will be presenting on the project at the upcoming Pacific AIDS Network Skills Building Conference in March.

Events: World AIDS Day

William Booth, Executive Director, along with local students and community partners spoke in support of a resolution tabled by City Counselor Tim Stevens requesting City of Vancouver involvement for World AIDS Day. The Resolution was passed unanimously and World AIDS Day will now be included in the City's annual special events calendar.

The Red Ribbon Campaign was a great success raising awareness and support for World AIDS Day. The day was launched with a gala photo exhibition at City Hall and was opened by the Mayor and City Councillors.

Project Stitch was a huge success as a World AIDS Day event at the Croatian Cultural Centre and was attended by over 350 youth who produced quilt pieces for the Digital Quilt. This project received excellent media attention and increased partnership opportunities with new community

The HIV/AIDS Nutrition Education Exchange program

The AIDS Vancouver Grocery program provides weekly, supplemental food to an average of 700 individuals and families living in poverty with HIV/AIDS. Last year, with help from the United Way, AV initiated a nutrition-related educational program in conjunction with the AV grocery. Although the AV Grocery program provides food to five different sites, the NEET (Nutrition Education Exchange Team) volunteers work with clients at only one site, the Seymour Street site in downtown Vancouver.

The HIV/AIDS Nutrition Education Exchange program is designed to develop and deliver nutrition education and skills building programming to AV Grocery clients. Patrons can spend up to 40 minutes waiting to access the Grocery, during which time NEET Volunteers (nutritionist students or dieticians) hand out education resources and food samples, answer questions, exchange recipes, and hold cooking demos and nutrition-themed games and contests.

Other NEET volunteers work quietly behind the scenes to develop the weekly Nutrition News, contests and educational materials,

along with menu planning for the grocery. Plans are currently underway to take grocery clients out on a tour of their local grocery and to hold a nutritional seminar for AV Grocery patrons.

Client participation in NEET program activities during the pilot phase averaged 50% or better among the 500 weekly patrons that access the Grocery at AIDS Vancouver's Seymour site. In a recent survey of nearly 200 grocery patrons, over 2/3 of clients felt strongly that the program provided a place to freely discuss issues related to nutrition which, in turn, improved their nutrition knowledge and skills and allowed them to better address their nutritional concerns.

In December 2006, the Royal Bank of Canada Foundation generously donated \$5,000 to the Nutrition Education Exchange program. The RBC Foundation is committed to health and wellness, with an emphasis on supporting programs that improve community services and enhance quality of life. As proper nutrition is paramount in managing HIV illness progression, the RBC donation will be used to enhance existing and future nutritional educational activities.
